AMESBURY - After five years of leasing a 50,000square-foot building from ARC Technologies (now Hexcel Corp.), CI Works is buying the 110-plus year old mill building with plans of turning it into a modern, energy efficient structure for the benefit of its tenants.

Its goal is to turn the usual love-hate relationship between landlords and tenants into one that could better be described as a love-love connection.

CI Works announced last week that with financing through Enterprise Bank it has purchased the brick mill building at 11 Chestnut St., which for the last five years it has been leasing out to a wide assortment of young manufacturing companies.

In addition to the lighting upgrades, CI Works plans to have Summit Solar install solar panels on the roof to produce 200 kilowatts of power, enough to provide electricity to the building. It also plans to install two electric vehicle charging stations for employees to power up their cars for free, while at work.

One tenant, Blackburn Energy's CEO Peter Russo said, "We appreciate the flexibility and support CI Works provided this year. A startup has very few stable, reliable elements to its business. Blackburn appreciates the fact that CI Works provides some of those elements."

Blackburn, which manufactures a system that captures kinetic generated by trucks and stores the electricity in a battery pack, leases a working manufacturing shop, office, large group meeting space and parking of its test truck.
